YOUR RIGHTS AND DUTIES UNDER THE HONOR CODE

Rights

As a student of the Loyola University College of Law governed by the Honor Code, the Code seeks to protect your interest in:

- 1. Fair and ethical conduct from your fellow students in academic matters.¹
- 2. The right not to be charged, tried, or subjected to an Honor Board proceeding unless a formal complaint has been filed against you.²

As a student charged with a violation of the Honor Code, you have the following rights specifically enumerated in Section VII, Paragraph D of the Honor Code:

- 1. After a determination of probable cause, timely receipt of a copy of the original complaint and the investigation report.
- 2. Reasonable time to prepare your defense.
- 3. The assistance of a student defense counselor.
- 4. Timely production for copying and inspection of any tangible evidence that the presenter or hearing panel intends to offer at the hearing.
- 5. Timely advance notice of the names of all witnesses and of all persons known to have personal knowledge of the events at issue.
- 6. To present any relevant evidence and to question any witness(es).
- 7. To waive any right or process provided by the honor code.
- 8. To the presumption of innocence.
- 9. To refuse to testify. The hearing panel is entitled to draw reasonable inferences from a charged party's refusal to testify. Such inferences, however, shall not be the sole basis for a finding of guilt.
- 10. To admit your guilt and waive a formal hearing.
- 11. The right to a copy of any written rules of procedure promulgated by the honor board.

Further, the Honor Board will endeavor to the fullest extent to provide you with:

- 1. A fair and impartial hearing by a panel of your peers.
- 2. Confidentiality concerning all matters relative to any Honor Board proceeding except as provided in the Honor Code.
- 3. A speedy resolution of your case.

Duties

All students of the Loyola University College of Law have the following affirmative duties relative to the Honor Code:

- 1. To report any suspected Honor Code violation to the Honor Board^3
- 2. To comply with any Honor Board proceeding⁴ (Section IV, Paragraph H)
- 3. To refrain from the prohibited conduct enumerated in Section IV of the Honor Code
